NO REVIVAL of community activity has been more warmly welcomed than the Little Theatre. Driven off the boards by wartime necessities, the spare-time actor is acting again. He had a sort of counter-part in the semi-professionals of the service shows, but it wasn't the same thing. Now the amateur show is again in the hands of the local club and the local en-

The impulse to recreate life on the stage is an old one, and amateur acting is far more widespread than is generally known. No one who got his early years of education in a one-room country school is likely to forget the so-called 'dialogues" that were always a part of the pre-Christmas school concert. At the other end of the scale are the elaborately-staged plays put on by entrants at the regional and Dominion drama festivals. And in between, the hundreds of church, community and college drama clubs, from which one or two productions occassionally

emerge to make news at these formal festivals. Perhaps the most interesting development in the amateur stage in Canada is the fact that in isolated instances, communities are trying to get away from formalism.

Year after year, the regional festivals have produced the same old plays - the adjudicator often being forced to choose between two or three companies vying in the same lines and characters.

Now, occasionally, you find a group putting on a show that is native in inception and authorship as well as in the personalities of its players. It is in this field, in the re-creation of themes that are native - and at the same time universal, since humanity is universal - that the Canadian Little Theatre has its greatest opportunity to become a really important and living

WHAT IS CIVIL LIBERTY ?-

LIBERTY has many meanings. In ordinary usage, liberty means the ability to think and act as one chooses without interference, but in living with other people the limitation has to be added "so long as one's actions do not interfere with the equal liberty of others."

Civil liberties include freedom with respect to personal action, the possession and use of property, religious beliefs and worship, and the expression of opinion. The mere fact of living in a democracy does not make certain the maintenance of any group of liberties for the individual. A democratic government must be constantly on the alert to avoid a danger inherent in majority rule - the danger of imposing bondage upon

There is an important protecting factor: one liberty preserved under the democratic form of vernment is the right to complain about vio- pursuit, as Mark Twain drily pointed out. dation of one's liberty. So long as citizens have his breath seems a bit extreme. the right to make complaints, and the complaints are freely heard and fully considered, and so long as indicated reforms are speedily made, then citizens have the utmost of civil liberty that wise men look for.

ETHICS IN BUSINESS___

(By Joseph Lister Rutledge) THE OTHER DAY the newspapers reported, with varying degrees of envy, prejudice had earned a salary of \$60,000. a year.

That is a tidy little nest egg and it isn't wholly surprising that we 2,545,225 taxpayers who earned less and, mainly, so much less, found she came to the House of Commons the figure one to get mad about but not to understand. But the catch in the statement is that there is a relatively distant association between what you earn, and what an all-wise government permit you to keep.

In all Canada there are only some 584 fortunate persons who earn, in this governmental sense, upward of \$50,000. 
