Garbage Will Be Picked up Semi-Weekly

Next Tuesday morning the first Municipal Garbage Collection will take place and will fulfil a demand that has been made for some time by many citizens of the community. The collections will be made twice a week, Tuesday and Friday mornings, in the future.

The decision to undertake a municipal collection was made at the meeting of the Village Council on Tuesday night on a motion sponsored by Councillors Patterson, Driscoll, Marshall, and the others.

All Garbage must be placed in suitable containers, at the curb, not later than eight o'clock in the morning. The garbage need not be wrapped except tea and coffee grounds, and these should be separately wrapped in paper.

Fred Graham has entered into an agreement with the Village Council to make the collections at a charge of \$5.00 per load. Mr. Graham plans to utilize the garbage in feeding pigs. The annual yearly cost is estimated at approximately \$600.00 per year, which means almost two mills on the tax rate.

Opening Tourist Lodge On Former Arthur Low Estate

"The Low Estate" located on Lots four and five in the first concession of Walpole, is taking on a "new look." Under the direction of Hector Munro and Mr. Maundrell, both of Cornwall, the large brick mansion is being completely renovated with a view to opening it as a Tourist Lodge early next month.
