

ANNUAL MEETING
HALDIMAND C.A.S.

The Children's Aid Society of the County of Haldimand held their Annual Dinner Meeting at the Youth Centre, Kohler, on Wednesday, April 28th, 1948, at 6.30 P.M. The meeting was well attended, about seventy members being present. The ladies of the Holmes Women's Institute catered for the dinner.

The retiring president, Rev. G. Moore W. Smith, spoke briefly of the pleasure he had had in serving on the Board of Directors of the Society for several years and expressed his best wishes for the future success of the organization.

Mrs. Evelyn O'Brien gave the Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Society and making an urgent plea for additional foster homes to care for the children for whom the Society is responsible. The work of the Society touched the lives of 234 children during the past year and in this work were encountered the problems of poor housing and overcrowding, poor housekeeping and home-making, intemperance, lack of income and a widespread lack of training in marriage adjustment and parenthood.

The Foster Home Committee report was given by Mrs. J. N. Campbell, Chairman, who stated that her committee consisting of Mrs. A. J. Mackay, Mrs. R. D. Blott, Mrs. Ross Crosby, and Miss Marie Jewhurst had considered such problems as the need of additional foster homes, the advisability of securing a detention home for the temporary lodging of juvenile delinquents and the need of a reception home where children can be admitted at any hour of the day or night. The committee also studied the cost of maintaining children in foster homes in such places as Toronto — the figures to be used as a basis in estimating the amounts necessary to provide for children here.

Rev. F. R. Anderson, Chairman of the Committee on Child Care, gave his report stating that two significant resolutions were presented to the Board of Directors from the committee. One asked that the County of Haldimand give earnest consideration to the establishment of a separate detention for juveniles only and the second that recognition be given to the standing need for some provision for a reception home within the County of Haldimand for children where their personalities can be studied prior to placement in foster homes. Members of the Child Care Committee are County Warden Roy T. Hewitt, Mr. Milton Wigle, Rev. F. R. Anderson, Mrs. Archer Baldwin, Miss Ethel Walker, and Mrs. W. J. McCarthy.

In the absence of Mr. E. C. Colter, the report of the Juvenile Court Committee was given by Rev. Malcolm Johnston. The Committee was set up in the fall of 1947 with E. C. Colter as Chairman and Miss Jennie Kinneer, Rev. Malcolm Johnston and Father McHugh as members. Mr. Colter's report states that the Juvenile
