of the present Canadian House of Commons is a lawyer. Of the nineteen members of the federal cabinet, ten are lawyers - the ratio is usually higher. Of the nine provincial premiers, five are lawyers. Of the nine men nominated for the Liberal leadership, seven - including the final choice - were lawyers. Of the three men standing for the Progressive

You might read a number of conclusions into those statistics. Some people might contend, in a mild and nettled way, that Canada's mic creeds so much as in a dominating profession. Others could accuse the lawyer of an exceptional lust for political power. Others might say he has, rather, an exceptional sense

But isn't there, among the others, a strongly-valid argument that much of the cause of this lies with the other professions and callings that have largely surrendered the field? Isn't it less the responsibility of the lawyers to move over and make room than for the others to do the things that would justifiably make them do

Regardless of the lure that draws the lawyer into politics, he has done great things once there. He has given us Macdonald and Laurier and Borden and Bennett and many others. It would seem to be far better to aim at emulation of his record than elimination of his spe-

It is true that, as a group, lawyers do understand and handle the problems of govern-ment quickly and ably. But men like schoolteacher Coldwell and preacher Knowles and, yes political scientist King show there is no need for complete capitulation.

What, for instance, becomes of the college men who study political science? Few of them get into Parliament, Mr. King to the contrary. Are school instructions in civics and government dull and uninspiring to the point that they make incipient interest abortive? Are employers doing enough to encourage their help, high and low, to understand let alone engage in politics? Are we, briefly, in the varied strata of our

national life, incapable of infusing the processes of our democracy with a more dynamic enthusiasm and activity among other people than the lawvers who seem to take to them as a corollary of their business?
