EXTRACTIVE FARMING FATAL

WHEN WE LOOK at what has happened on other continents we see that the extractive farming process has milked the soil of its fertility and exhausted the soil of its nutrients.

So much for the Far East. That of turn to Europe. Before the war most countries imported food — the United Kingdom to the extent of 50 per cent, Germany 25 per cent, Greece 40 per cent.

Africa cannot support a large population. It offers, says Voegt, the lowest carrying capacity per square mile of any continent.

Southwestern Asia is being demonstrated, though amid scenes of regrettable upheaval, what can be done in restoration of unproductive land.

SO THERE IS THE STORY of the world's present situation in regard to food, and of some of the factors causing it. The causes include lack of attention to land usage and lack of expenditure on land care; erosion; depletion of needed chemicals; faulty cropping; pests and waste.

There are other frontiers, of course. Science can, perhaps, come to our rescue. If it turns out to be as successful with plant and animal diseases as with human diseases. It may develop cold-resistant grains which will open up farming in dry regions.

And even twenty per cent increase in production would fall short. Assuming a rise in population of only twenty-five per cent by 1960, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations estimates that the following increases over pre-war production would be the minimum needed to meet its target:

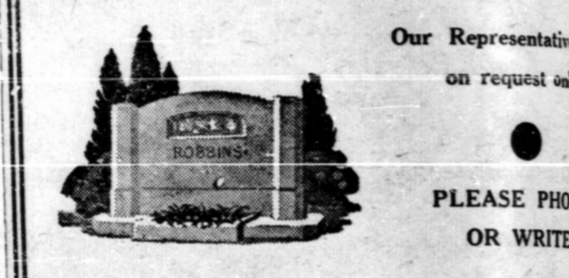
