The late Mrs. Elva Rodgers, who passed away this past week, occupied a unique place in the annals of Canadian Weekly Journalism. She was editor and publisher of The Jarvis Record for a Twenty year period when we doubt very much if she had any counterpart in the whole Dominion who have since tried their hand with success in the publishing business — but very few. We have been told that she was a success in a business which at that time presented more formidable problems than today. On the few occasions in later years that we had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Rodgers there developed a bond of friendship that will help us to hold her memory dear for a long time to come.

With nominations so close to hand it might be a good time to suggest the necessity of a building-by-law in Jarvis.
