ESCAPE TO THE WILDERNESS-

"RUGGED INDIVIDUALISM" is said to be exemplified with a vengeance by one Percy Leggitts who lives alone in a cave-like little tent in the wilds of Northern Ontario. Leggitts who is fifty-six years old, is said to have disappeared from a comfortable home in Montreal three years ago, and his relatives had given him up for lost. He is a typical hermit, with a scraggy beard and clothes made from sacking, and his diet consists of dry cereal, carrots, nuts and a spoonful of dry coca for Sunday dessert. He declares that, for once in his life, he has found complete contentment and that he

has never before enjoyed such good health. Hermits were quite common in primitive societies, and they usually withdrew into soli tude from religious or philosophical motives. Diogenes did not take to the woods, but lived in Athens. Discarding all conventions, he made his abode in a tub. When Alexander asked what he might do for him, Diogenes replied "Only step out of my sunlight." He went about in the daytime with a lantern "looking for a man," by which he showed his contempt for

But not all the hermits have been cynics. Many of them were devout and kindly souls who would hospitably entertain strangers in their well-kept huts or caves. Someone has said that a man who lives in complete solitude is either a wild beast or a god. The prophet Elijah period ically withdrew to desert solitudes where he is said to have been fed by ravens, but he emerged to confront Ahab with a prophecy of nationwide disaster if Israel did not forsake her evil ways. John the Baptist made his home in the wilderness, clothed in goat-skins and living on locusts and wild honey, but he was not content to stay there, and he lost his head in consequen-

Milton, who was somewhat of a recluse, said that "solitude is sometimes the best society, and short retirement urges sweet return." But poets have the faculty of retiring within themselves. They live in a world of imagination and can walk in solitude amid the hustling throng of a city street. Stephen Phillips, in a poem on London, described the sense of loneliness that came over him while standing in the midst of the surging throng and roaring traffic of The Strand. I can only recall one line of the poem iin which he likened the roar of London to "the heaving silence of the middle main." With its polulation of eight million, London is a safe place in which to hide, and prominent men of other cities who have fallen into disgrace or loss of fortune have been known to fly to the Metropolis in order to lose their identity and live the rest of their lives in loneliness.

And yet, although its congested population tends to submerge the individual into the mass, London has produced some of the most outstanding individuals the world has ever known. It is comparatively easy to be a "big toad in a small puddle," but only the genius or men of undaunted ambition can rise to distinction above the clamoring multitudes of a great city. The intense competition is doubtless responsible for the development of outstanding individuals in the big cities, but some of the greatest geniuses who have risen there came originally from the small towns and rural districts. Shakespeare was the son of a tanner in the little town of Stratford, Newton was the son of a farmer, and a long list of men who rose to greatness in London could be cited to show how much the big

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
