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## Report On Older Boys' Parliament

At last, after some years, Haldimand County boys were represented at the Ontario Older Boys' Parliament. Each year in the Fall Church boys groups have the privilege of nominating candidates. Then at the end of November these groups hold an election. I was nominated by my own Sunday School Class this year and opposed by Robert Mitchell of Dunnville. The Parliament is composed of leaders in boys' work from the Protestant Churches of the Province. This year from December 27th to 31st, sixty-eight such leaders met for the Parliament in the Ontario Ladies College at Whitby.

Parliament opened with the signing of the Oath of Allegiance promising to be faithful and bear true allegiance to the King of Great Britain. Sessions were held in which we used procedure in most ways similar to that of our political parliaments. We divided into Government (I was on the Government side) and Opposition though rarely did the sides vote solidly. In the seven sessions Bills were introduced, discussed, amended, revised and passed or otherwise, in the regular way.

Bills dealing with the following matters were introduced at this Parliament: Camps, Boys' Work Support, World Peace, The Canteen, etc. To consider these Acts the House dissolved into the Committee of the Whole which gives more liberty to debate.

Beside the seven sessions, were periods of Worship, Bible Study, Leadership Training, periods for legislative committees and for general and party caucuses. Although the program thus occupied nearly all our time the principal of the College, Rev. S. Osborne provided recreation with riding horses, swimming pool and gymnasium.

Since 1917 such Parliaments have been held. James G. Gibson of Caledonia was Premier of the 8th Parliament. At present similar Parliaments are held annually in other Provinces. This year several members from Quebec joined us. A National Parliament is also being projected.

The Older Boys' Parliament is not a "mock" Parliament. The legislation passed sets the policy for boys work in the Churches of the Province through the coming year. The members are expected to see that it is carried out. — L. LUNDY

### CANADIAN GREYHOUND LINES MERGED

Canadian Greyhound Lines operating between Detroit, Windsor, Niagara Falls and Buffalo; and with divisions between Windsor and Leamington, Windsor and Kingsville, will be merged with Eastern Canadian Greyhound Lines as of January 1st. The merger will add 842.9 route miles to the Eastern Canadian system currently operating bus service between Detroit, Windsor and Toronto, Windsor, Sarnia, Little Current and Espanola; and between Sault Ste Marie and North Bay. Passengers will benefit from better service resulting from coordinated schedules, more efficient use of equipment and from resulting economies.

## Appointed Public School Inspector For Haldimand

Assistant Public School Inspector for Norfolk County for the past year and four months, Harold A. Christie has been appointed Inspector for Haldimand County, his new duties commencing today. In Haldimand, Mr. Christie is succeeding Edgar Eade, Inspector here for the past six years, who has been transferred to East York in a similar capacity. Since coming to Norfolk in September 1947, Mr. Christie has been assisting to inspect the appointment of a new Assistant Inspector.

Although Mr. Christie will eventually have his Haldimand headquarters at Caledonia, he has been unable to find suitable accommodation there and for the present time will have his office in Hagersville. He and Mrs. Christie will reside near Hagersville until accommodation can be secured in Caledonia. They will move to Hagersville the latter part of this month.

A veteran of the Second Great War, Mr. Christie enlisted with the R.C.N.V.R. in January, 1942, attaining the rank of Lieutenant and served overseas. He left the Navy in October, 1945, and attended Queen's University and the Ontario College of Education before coming to Simcoe. Prior to the war he taught in Bruce County and at Sudbury, where he was principal of College Street School. Since coming to Simcoe, Mr. and Mrs. Christie have been actively associated with Trinity Anglican Church.

Five candidates have qualified for council seats in the Village and consequently an election will be held next Monday, January 10th. Twelve candidates were nominated for council seats at the adjourned nomination meeting on Monday night. Three for the Reeveship and nine for the three seats in the School Board. In addition to Reeve Walker, two other names were placed in nomination for the Reeve ship. These were ex-Reeve Les Marshall and A. B. Blight. Both announced their intention to withdraw their names at the nomination meeting. Reeve Geo. W. Walker was therefore accorded an acclamation for his third term.

Two of the retiring trustees for the school Board, R. B. Hoover and A. B. Lundy did not qualify. Their places along with former Trustee Gordon Hazlett, will be taken by Stan Mitchell and Marshall. The five candidates qualifying for Council were: N. L. Marshall, J. G. Paterson, W. B. Henderson, John Weir and Edward Slater. Marshall and Paterson were both members of the 1948 council while the latter was a newcomer to the municipal field.

Other candidates nominated for Council but not qualifying were: David Banks, Chas. D. Butts, Norman Graham, Elson Feld, John Perekys, Stan Mitchell and George Rod. Nominated for the School Board, but failing to qualify were: E. B. Hoover, A. E. Lundy, W. E. Henderson, Mrs. A. B. Lundy, Earl Slater and Edward Slater. A poll will be opened at the Walpole Mutual Fire Insurance Co. Office on Monday, January 10th, at 5 o'clock and will remain open until 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

There will be only two changes in the Haldimand County Council this year from 1948. The two newcomers are A. L. Tumbling, Deputy Reeve of Dunnville and Earl Gifford, Reeve of South Cayuga. Deputy Reeve Tumbling was accorded an acclamation when Gordon Camelford advanced to the Reeve ship following the retirement of Les Marshall. Reeve Gifford, succeeds Lloyd Hager, who retired as Reeve of South Cayuga after holding the position for thirteen years.

There were three contests for the Reeve ship but in no case was the position changed. Reeve Stanley Coverdale of North Cayuga defeated Paul Bacher who opposed him for the office. Reeve Gerald Fyle also retained his seat against opposition in Sherbrooke and Ross Fleming defeated Gerald Pagan in Oneida Township.
