More Facts About the Vote

The voting on February 3rd, touches only hard liquor. It leaves unchanged the selling of beer and wine in the beverage and dining rooms of the hotels in Jarvis.

The vote on February 3rd blocks for three years any further voting in Jarvis on liquor or on beer and wine.

Sect. 72-(1) of the Liquor Licence Act, 1946, reads-"Where a question is submitted in a municipality under section 69 or 70, neither that question nor any other question shall be submitted in the municipality until after the expiration of a period of three years from the date of such submission."

Thus, a citizen who wants beer and wine sold in Jarvis may vote to keep out hard liquor, without fear cutting off the beer and the wine.

And a citizen who wants Jarvis freed of all alcoholic everages, has no power to touch beer and wine for three years from the vote next month.
