The reading device. which resembles a pencil, scans any page of ordinary type. The blind person using it wears an earphone connected to the instrument. The device "reads," then "talks back" to the blind by transmitting sounds. The second electronic aid developed, carried in the hand like a flashlight, is a substitute for the tapping cane. The sounds, which vary with the nearness of objects, are transmitted to the blind person, allowing him to scan scenery, detect trees, rocks and water.

To anyone hatching pheasant chicks for the first time, we would like to give a word of warning "BE SURE TO KEEP THE CHICKS DRY." The hicks getting wet accounts for a

great percentage of the mortality rate in young birds. Some reports were received on first hatches to come off. Twelve eggs are set under a hen and hatchings of ten chicks have been reported.

A letter from the Department of Lands and Forests stating that they had 150 pheasant poults available for each township was read. These birds will be shipped between June
