DUGGED OR HYPNOTIZED ?-

SOVIET FLAIR FOR PLANNING is not confined to the social and industrial life of Russia, but is displayed in all its diplomatic and propaganda activities. There was something echanical and tiresomely monotonous, for instance, about the recent "confessions" at the trials conducted under Communist auspices in Hungary and Bulgaria. They were an exact replica of those made during the purge trials in Russia some years ago, when each of the accused got up and recited the same indictment against himself. It was quite evident that the trial" had been conducted at length before the prisoners appeared in the open court, and the erdict had been already arrived at and agreed to by the "culprits."

A great deal of curiosity has been aroused as to the methods adopted behind the iron or stone curtains to insure such unanimity in the admission of guilt. It has been suggested that the prisoners were doped with some mysterious drug which rendered them submissive to hypnotic control. Some medical men agree that this possible. But drugs are not necessary for inducing a state of hypnotism. One of the methods commonly used is to have the subject gaze at a bright object while the operator passes his hands before the subject's face and suggests to him that he is going to sleep. "In deep hyponsis," says one authority, "the sensory system and muscles are greatly affected. The subject responds to suggestions, may exhibit supernormal strength, or assume strained attitudes without fatigue, and on waking may remember

little or nothing of his experience.' One of the accused at the Bulgarian trials, a Protestant pastor, declared in court that he

had been forced to stand facing a blank wall for seventy-two hours. If this was part of the ypnotic process, it evidently didn't work, and the pastor may have pretended to submit to the suggestions of guilt until he stood in the dock. Some of the other prisoners may have made such a pretence, but were afraid to tell the truth lest they should be subject to worse mental and physical torture. Of course there is no actual


