Erie L.O.B.A. Regular Meeting

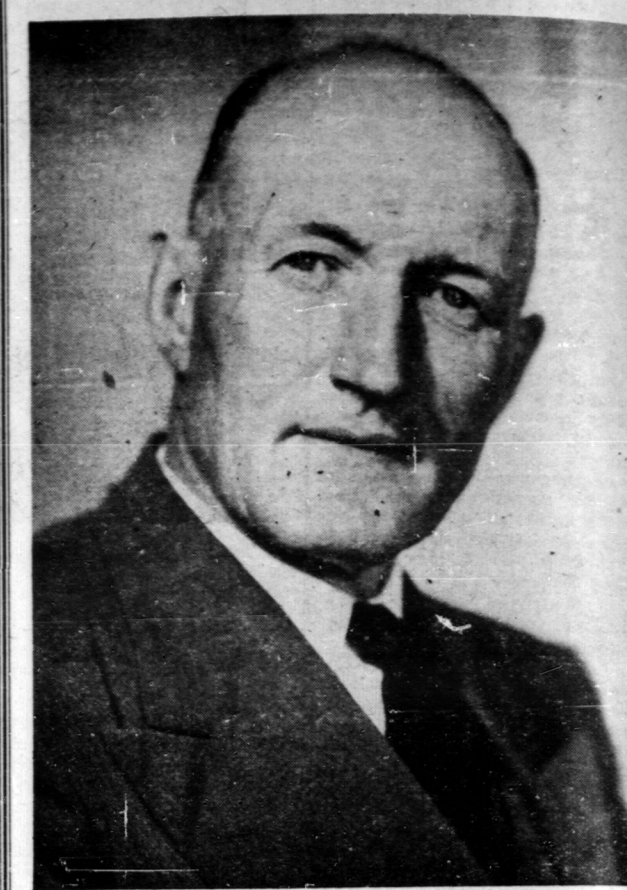

This Week

Manitoulin Island, one of the last strongholds of the 1876 Canada Temperance Act, will come under the provisions of the Ontario Liquor Control Act after thirty-five years under the federal legislation.

A vote Monday which followed a lengthy controversy that drew about 1,000 of the 5,882 eligible voters to the polls, showed an almost 2-1 opposition to the federal act.

Criticism of the Canada Temperance Act centred around the fact that it prohibited only the sale of liquor on the northern Lake Huron vacation island. It carried no restrictions on consumption of spirits.

The act will remain in force until after thirty days following the vote. The Ontario Liquor Control Act will automatically come into effect on publication of the order-in-council but another vote will be necessary to decide whether residents favor opening of hotel beverage rooms.
