ON THE FARM FRONT

because of this disease. It seems to be the general opinion that from \$50.00 to \$80.00 per farm is being lost annually as a result of this plant disease. Treatment of the seed is comparatively simple and easily accomplished, that is for covered seed. In the case of loose sown seed there is no very practical method of control and it is suggested that farmers may be well advised to have a small plot of registered grain to be used as seed from year to year.

Anyone expecting to make application for field inspection, either for registration of seed or certification, should immediately make application for a copy of the new form to be used. The Plant Products Division for this region requests that these applications for field inspection be returned by June 15th for winter wheat and July 1st for oats and barley. In any case no seed which is registered unless the grower is a member of the Canadian Seed Growers Association and if you are a new grower, application for membership must be forwarded by July 31st of the year in which registration is requested.

That brings to mind another date which we must remember and having in mind the application for forest trees for next year, if you expect to use any trees at all, application for the same should be made before August 15th of this year.

Board Of Trade Recommends Regulated Main St. Parking

The congested parking situation in the business section of Main Street, Jarvis, has become a real danger to pedestrians, particularly children, was given a thorough going over at the last meeting of the Board of Trade. The discussion ended in a resolution to be forwarded to the Village Council recommending a plan of regulated parking of vehicles in this area.

The recommendation calls for diagonal parking on one side of the street from Main to Peel and parallel parking on the other side; that heavy trucks be prohibited from parking in this area, except for delivery purposes, and that Main Street be widened from Peel Street north to the bridge.

With diagonal parking on both sides of Main Street in this area there is little more than enough room for two vehicles to pass and frequently the screeching of brakes indicate that another youngster about to cross the street had a narrow escape from possible death and certainly serious injury. The heavy truck traffic in this area increases the hazard. It was felt that by instituting regulated parking on one side this hazard would largely be overcome. The parking of heavy vehicles in the immediate vicinity of Main Street is a hazard quite frequently by virtue of the fact they are unable to clear the travelled portion of the street by extending so far out onto the highway as to be clear of the traffic by the time the parking of buses on the highway also came in for criticism.
