Ontario Tobacco Crop Will Beat All Records
Ontario's fine-cured tobacco crop for 1949 was the largest and showed the best quality in all history, statistics of the Department of Agriculture report. Amount of the crop is roughly estimated at 110,000,000 pounds. Production in 1948 was 98,000,000 pounds and acreage was 87,000. Acreage for 1949 was 102,000.

Burley tobacco harvest was completed at a comparatively early date this year. The crop cured well and should, according to reports, bring a total crop of 13,000,000 pounds from the 11,000 acres planted. Last year's crop totalled 12,841,000 pounds.

An interesting sidelight on the tobacco industry in Ontario is provided by the records of the Department of Agriculture. In 1921 when tobacco growing was a minor venture in the Province, total production was 1,000,000 pounds and acreage with 102,500 acres in 1949.
