**JUNIOR CLUB WORK IN CANADA AVAILABLE IN BOOK**

An informative booklet, well-prepared and attractively bound, dealing with the work of the Canadian Council on Boys' and Girls' Club Work is just off the press. Published in Ottawa, the book contains full-page photographs of Viscount and Viscountess Alexander and a message from Canada's Governor General.

In the pages that follow is a complete record of valuable co-ordinating work carried on by the council for rural young people. A message from Rt. Hon. James G. Gardiner, Federal Minister of Agriculture, follows a similar greeting from Viscount Alexander. Photographs of each of Canada's Provincial Ministers of Agriculture, with messages are also included.

Compilations of data concerning Boys' and Girls' Club work in Canada reveals that there are 45,333 boys and girls enrolled in various clubs in the Dominion. It is also revealed that Ontario tops the list with 1,164 clubs and an active membership of 10,405. Incidentally the record shows that total at the end of last year grew from a total membership for all Canada of only 21,142 in 1931.

Excellent action photographs showing various young people's activities in Rural Canada, are contained with detailed information on each Province.

"Since 1931 enrollment of the Canadian Council on Boys' and Girls' Club Work has more than doubled," says Viscount Alexander in his message of greeting.
