ARTS GET A HEARING-

SOME OF US were surprised when the government announced that the state of the arts in Canada was to be the subject of a Royal Commission investigation. It seemed strange that the problems of painters and poets should rate the kind of hearing usually reserved for political scandals, economic inequities and other ssues of national importance.

Apparently the government doesn't think And the Massey Commission seems to be listening attentively to the wide variety of proposals brought forward by organizations which have labored long at the unrewarding task of developing Canada's artistic talents.

There may be some who neither know nor care if Canada has a national art gallery or a national theatre. Many haven't read a Canadian poem or novel since leaving high school. But most Canadians listen to the radio and run across the occasional Canadian-made short subject at the movies. If the people who run these movies and radio programs are interested in improving their output, we certainly aren't opposed to giving them a hearing.

Come to think of it, that hard-working bunch of youngsters put on a good show in the summer theatre performance last month. Too bad they didn't get a little more support. And then there was the music festival last spring. There was the little girl who came

third in the ten-year-old piano competition. Perhaps the commission could figure out a way for her to get lessons from a good teacher. We've all heard of youngsters who headed their high school drawing classes or sang solos in the church choir and wound up driving a

truck. Maybe they're better off that way, but it would be a good idea if they had a chance to find out whether they could make a successful career painting pictures or singing songs..... Well, of course it takes money. the government can afford to pay all those civil servants in Ottawa, they can spare a little cash

for things like that. That's why the Royal Commission is listening to all those authors and musicians and radio executives. And the chances are that most of us and our children will benefit from the report they hand in to Parliament.

WELSH INVASION OF ENGLAND

- By Lewis Milligan -

THE ANCIENT BRITONS once occupied the whole of England, but with the periodic invasions of the Angles and the Saxons from the east, and the Romans from the south, they were driven westward fighting to the Cambrian hills and into Cornwall. And now the Welsh Britons have returned and conquered England. least so it appears to me from a study of Eng-The Men of Harlech who were once on the defensive have assumed the offensive, and that not in politics alone.

While reading English newspapers, literary and religious journals recently, I was struck with the fact that so many of the signed articles were by Welshmen. Welsh surnames or Christian names seemed to predominate-Evans, Owens, Williams, Jones, Thomas, Davies, Lloyd Lewis, Trewin, Trevor, Gwyn, Ifer, Llewellyn, Rhys, etc., etc. From this it would seem that the Cambrians are not only coming, but have already arrived in force. It was perhaps Lloyd George who led this latest invasion, particularly into English politics, and he has been followed by a host of his countrymen. It may be too much to say that anything

like a majority of the English members of Parliament are Welshmen, but a goodly number of them representing English constituencies are either Welsh or of Welsh extraction. Many of them are outstanding leaders in the Labor Party, although they are by no means confined to that party alone. Former Welsh miners have been especially aggressive in the Labor Movement in recent years. Aneurin Bevan is perhaps the most aggressive of these. He worked in the coal mines as a lad and his hatred of bosses got into his bones: he has now become a big ooss himself in politics. Ernest Bevin, who was born on the borders of South Wales and is probably of Welsh extraction, started life as a poor boy and became a fiery labor leader: but his experience of responsibility as a member of the War Cabinet tempered his rebellious spirit and broadened his political outlook.

Of course, there has always been a steady migration of Welsh people into England, more particularly to the large cities of the north and the midlands. My own native city of Liverpool was to a large extent populated by Welsh immigrants, although a considerable number came from the North of Ireland in the early years, and I am myself a queer mixture of those two elements. But the Welsh people, as I know them in Liverpool, and from my visits to relatives in North Wales, were not of the rebellious type. They were industrious and of a rather placid nature; fond of music and great sing-There were Welsh language churches in all parts of the city. Love of religion was the chief trait in the Welsh character, and the smooth lyric quality of the Welsh language gave a deep fervour to their preaching and sing-

In this connection I recall the visit of Evan Roberts to Liverpool during the great Welsh Revival. People flocked to hear him, as they do today to see a hockey match, and thousands were unable to gain admittance. The meeting which I attended was held in a large Tabernacel, and I only gof in by unlawful means through a basement window. I found the auditorium packed to the roof and took up a standing position behind the rostrum.

Unlike most evangelists, Evan Roberts was o great preacher, but he wielded a dynamic influence over that vast congregation without any apparent effort. He was a tall, handsome young man, with the face of an actor and a shock of chestnut hair. When he spoke, he seemed to do so on sudden impulses, and his voice was soft and melodious, but manly. He roamed about the rostrum sweeping his arms leisurely from side to side and casting his eyes into every corner of the building. He stopped suddenly in his speech, leaned forward with his hands upon the desk and jerked his head upward, as if in a spasm of inarticulate prayer. Then casually lifting the leaves of the open Bible, he said: "Does it not say here, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world?"
