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#### How The Moon Fools The Eye.....

One of the most baffling and as yet unsolved problems that scientists are now trying to explain is the apparent alteration in the size of the moon as it rises and crosses the night sky. They know quite well that the moon is practically the same size when it first appears as it is when directly overheard. They it is when directly overheard. They also know that the shrinking in size is an optical illusion, but exact-ly how that illusion is caused remains a mystery.

on the horizon looks about three times the size of the moon overhead, but though the moon can fool our eyes it can't fool the camera, and a filia of the moon rising shows it to be practically the same size all the time it is visible. Actually, when the moon is overhead it should look bigger than when it is on the horizon because

But when we check this with our own eyes we find just the opposite. Astronomers have been trying to explain this illusion for centuries. Some thought the horizon moon seems larger because we compare it with trees and buildings also in the line of sight, whereas when it is high in the sky no such comparison can be made.

the size of a big harvest moon can be brought down to normal by forefinger. The same thing happens if you bend down and look at the moon for a long time the illusion gradually disappears. A man who

has lost an eye does not have any illusion at all. When the moon is overhead it can be made to appear as big as a horizon moon if the observer lies on his back. In that position his eyes are in the same position a when he stands erect looking at the
