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

you have to the ground to form the outline of your pit. Take some to form the correct mixture of contract. Mixing concrete is heavy sharp instrument and mark this outline off so that the strings may be removed. Then you start to dig because you must have a base for the grill that will not allow it to sirk and become unlevel. You accomplish this by sinking the blocks their full 8" in the ground. The base is completed.

Now take two and one-halt blocks back wall of the firebox. On top of these you place two more blocks and another one on top of these two, so that you have a simulated chimuey in the back. All blocks should be placed so that they interlace, since this lessens their chance of falling. Since no cement is used, the blocks may be replaced easily should one crack from the heat. However, chances are you won't have to worry about this for several years.

How To Build A Barbecue Grill

Naturally you'll need first to select your building site. Choose a spot where there is shade in the late afternoon, if this is possible. You had better get the whole family together to decide on this, because although the grill can be moved, it is unnecessarily hard work. Then you must place your order for concrete blocks. It will take 63 whole blocks and 12 half ones. While this order is being filled, you can use this time to find the articles you must be built up with either concrete blocks. The grill must be obtained and can cither be made out of iron rods about ½ inch in diameter, or any suitable grill that can withstand great heat.
