RAILWAY STRIKE LOOMS
A railway strike loomed for Canada this week. A. R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees (C.B.R.E.), took one look at a conciliation board's report on his union's wage-hour demands and said the 30,000 members would hold a five-day week without reduction in take-home pay, and a check-off of union dues. The report rejected the wage demands and recommended a 44-hour week with some reduction in take-home pay. It is reported that over \$240,000 will be shared by Newfoundland beaver trappers in the near future. Almost 14,000 pelts were secured this season (but) the demand for beaver fur fell below normal this year. - Corner Brook (Nfld.) Western Star
