farm help in the nature of Dutch families with and without children and it is generally recognized that this is a fairly high class of farm labour. These men have all had some farm experience and many of them can speak English.

In spite of this, however, Haldimand farmers do not seem to be taking advantage of the opportunity. At a recent meeting called for the purpose of meeting a representative of the Department of Immigration in connection with Dutch farm labour only one farmer turned up. This help however, is still available, for how long we do not know, and anyone wishing to get in touch with the Department of Immigration can get the necessary address from your Agricultural Representative.

Final figures on the acreage, production and value of farm crops, have just been issued and in the case of Haldimand County, it is noted that the total acreage of wheat this year is up by about 1800 acres, but the average yield has dropped off by two bushels per acre, leaving the total yield about 2,000 bushels under what it was a year ago. Feed crops including oats, barley mixed grains or about 5,000 acres although the final estimate gives a slight increase in yield of total bushels available for feed purposes. Most of this comes from the oat crop, and it will be recalled that oats yielded better than have to be some care exercised in the livestock over. Hay and Clover and Alfalfa show a slight decrease in the total tonnage.

A recent survey completed by the Department of Agricultural Economics at the Ontario Agricultural College gives some rather enlightening figures on farm capital and the amazing thing is that the total capital invested on a general beef farm in the neighbourhood of \$38,000, 000.00 as compared with just under \$29,000.00 for a specialty dairy farm, and \$26,000.00 for a general farm. On the other hand, the total farm income in the same order, but the farm income and the labour earnings put the specialty dairy farm at the top of the list, and the general beef farm at the bottom. This was largely because of the heavy farm expenses recorded for the general farm. This gives some food for thought.
