Jarvis Centennial Notes

On June 17th, 1949, the present Prime Minister of Canada, the Honourable Louis Saint Laurent stopped at Jarvis for a few minutes. During his short stay several photos were obtained of Mr. St. Laurent and his party. The occasion of that visit raises the question as to whether Jarvis was ever visited by Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Wilfrid Laurier or any of the other Prime Ministers. If any such visits did occur, particulars of same would be appreciated, as well as any photos which may have been taken.

It would be interesting and worthwhile if a list could be compiled of persons who at one time or another called Jarvis and district home, and later in life attained distinction in public life. It seems to us that we have read of another Catherwood who was a member of the British Columbia Legislature for a number of years. He was either a native of Haldimand or descended from a native. In any case he was a close relative of our present Federal Member, Earl Catherwood, M.P.

We also recall that the late Terrance O'Reilly who farmed for many years at Willow Grove, between Caledonia and Hagersville, was very fond of telling of the occasion when Star spent a month or so working for him on his Oneida Township Farm. According to Mr. O'Reilly, Karlott arrived in Canada, in or about the year 1813, as an English immigrant and having applied for a position on a farm, was hired by Mr. O'Reilly. Mr. O'Reilly found Karlott to be a very satisfactory employee and regarded him very highly. However, acting as in his blood, and it was not long before he joined a Canadian Theatre Company which toured the country and finally folded up in Vancouver. From that point Boris Karloff (that isn't his real name) made his way to the film colony of Los Angeles, where he has since gained considerable fame as an actor.

Robert Jepson Sr. was Reeve of Hagersville in 1887, and progressive to that year had served at least seven years as Deputy Reeve.

Robert Waldbrook was Reeve of Walpole Township for several years, and in 1884 was Warden of Haldimand County.

Thomas Jepson was Reeve of Hagersville for the years 1927-1931, and was Warden of Haldimand County in 1931. Mr. Jepson and his twin brother Isaac still live in Hagersville.

The newly elected Reeve of Walpole for 1959, Edgar Waldbrook, is a grandson of both Robert Jepson and Robert Waldbrook, and a nephew of Thomas Jepson. It is quite a record of municipal service given by three generations in the Jepson family and two in the Waldbrook family.

Complete U. K. Bacon Contract

A contract under which Canada will sell 60,000,000 pounds of bacon to the United Kingdom at a price of 20 cents a pound has been completed by the two countries.

Both price and amount were lower than the last contract. Last year's contract called for 100,000,000 pounds at 38 cents, but Canada was able to sell more than 100,000,000 pounds. The Canadian government will absorb a loss of \$2,100,000 on the deal, since it will buy bacon at a floor price of 32.5 cents and sell it to Britain at 29 cents. Agriculture Minister Gardiner also announced price support of bacon will be ended on July 1, 1959, and after that shippers of bacon and pork products will be able to ship to United States markets.
