Jarvis Centennial Notes

Colbert - According to an article written by the late Thomas Butcher, and which appeared in the Record some years ago, Sherman's Corners was the name of the little hamlet which is now known as the Village of Jarvis. It appears from Mr. Butcher's article that a Mr. Sherman operated a team saw mill south of Jarvis on the bank of the Nanticoke Creek, and that he sold plank sawn at this mill. The name of the hamlet was subsequently changed to Jarvis in honour of the Honourable William Jarvis, and no better description of him can be given than to quote the inscription which appears below a stained glass window in St. James (Anglican) Cathedral, in Toronto, viz: "Sacred to the memory of the Honourable William Jarvis, U.E.L. an officer of the First American Regiment or Queen's Rangers. He served with that Corps during the American Revolutionary War. Was Secretary of State for the Province of Upper Canada, during the administrations of Messrs. Simcoe, Russell, Hunter and Gore 1792 to 1817 and first Provincial Grand Master of the Ancient Order of Free and Accepted Masons during the same period, and an original new holder of this Church. Was born at Stamford, Connecticut, 11th September, 1756. Died at York (Toronto) Upper Canada August 13th, 1817."

New Drain Inadequate To Carry Away Surface Water

The Department of Highways laid out a drainage ditch from the intersection of No. 3 and 6 Highways to Park Street last fall. It was thought that the problem of draining off excess waters in flood periods would be overcome. But the situation that developed on Tuesday morning proved that the time and effort spent on the project was of little value. On Tuesday morning there was more water floating across the intersection than was going down both drains. The water completely flooded the area in front of the Jarvis Hardware and Built's residence and as well poured into the sewer culvert as gushing as ever. After for comment on the situation Charles Bier, Highway foreman for the area, stated that the drainage system was simply inadequate to drain away the surface water that will develop under normal conditions. In his opinion the situation on Tuesday was not unusual and similar situations are sure to develop in the future. Mr. Bier pointed out the drains in question have an unusually large area of land to drain, probably in excess of one hundred acres, and he doubts if even a twenty-four inch drain would do the job. In addition, the water was being backed up by the culvert on the street going down to the arena. This culvert was cleaned out only a few weeks ago by the Village Council, but obviously the tile there is too small.
