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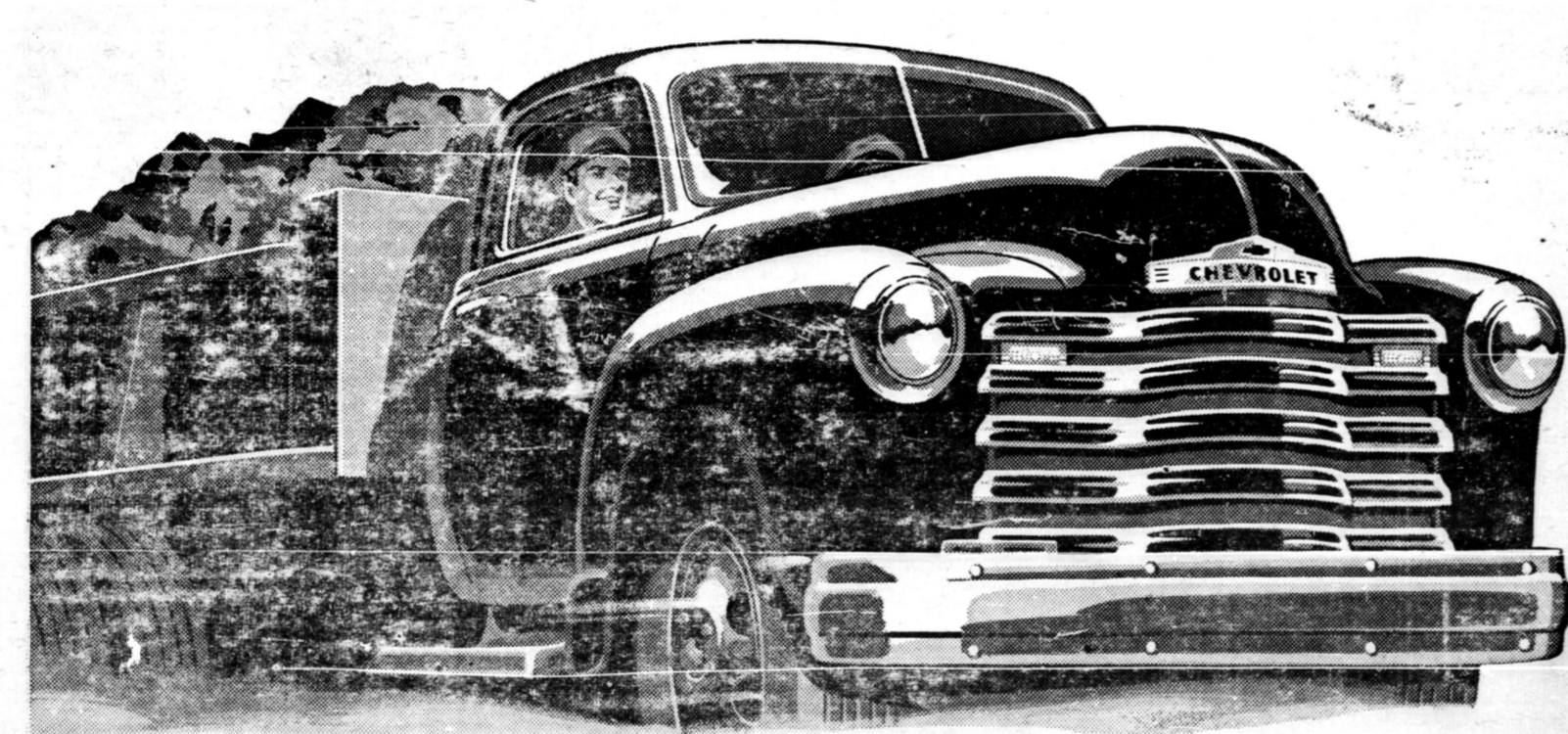

**KILLED IN CRASH**

The United States ambassador to Canada, Laurence Steinhardt, and four other persons were killed Tuesday when an American Douglas C-47 plane plunged into a field eleven miles southeast of Ottawa. Only one man, a U.S. Army air force sergeant, survived the crash which occurred soon after the plane left Ottawa for Washington.

Mr. Steinhardt, fifty-seven, had been in the U.S. foreign service since 1923. He had been ambassador to Russia and went to the Ottawa post in August, 1948. He had a distinguished career in the legal profession before entering the service which took him to such places as Peru, Turkey and Czechoslovakia as ambassador.

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**WALPOLE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL MEET**

The Municipal Council of the Town of Walpole met on this date and pursuant to adjournment with all members present and Reeve E. M. Waldbrook, presiding. Minutes of February meeting were read and all correspondence given due attention. Resolutions adopted:

Resolved that the minutes of February meeting be adopted as read. Carried.

Resolved that the Township of Walpole rent the Garnet Church shed for the term of three years at \$125.00 per year pursuant to adjournment with all members present and Reeve E. M. Waldbrook, presiding. Minutes of February meeting were read and all correspondence given due attention. Resolutions adopted:

Because this soil is heavy and cold, the growth of plant life is often very slow in the Spring. Consequently, even legumes will respond to a Spring application of Nitrogen, when grown on this type of soil.

The National 3-18-0 Fertilizer is, therefore, recommended for Spring grains, new seedlings and fertilization of established pasture and hay fields, when grown on the heavy clay and clay loam soils commonly found in Haldimand County and adjacent areas - providing these soils are known to contain sufficient quantities of Potash for crop growth. This of course, will depend to a great extent on the manner in which the soil has been farmed. The suggested rate of application for this brand is 250 to 350 lbs. to the acre.

Mr. Bruce Mehlenbacher, of Cayuga, well-known seed producer and seed dealer, has carried out - personally - many trials and tests on fertilization of new seedlings and established grass and clover crops, on his own farms. The results of his investigations have influenced the formulating of this new brand - National 3-18-0.

We believe that this is also an appropriate time to recall that many soils in the Haldimand County are quite acid. An acid condition should be corrected by an application of Lime.
