The May meeting of the Nanticoke Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society was held at the home of Mrs. Alfred Barlow with an attendance of sixteen. The program was "Growing with the Years" in the Auxiliary, as outlined in the April Missionary Monthly was used.

Mrs. Harvey Vokes led in the opening service of worship. The hymn used, "The Church's One Foundation" and the Scripture reading from John 17th chapter read by Mrs. Strimble, were the same as were used at the inaugural service of the Women's Missionary Society held in October 1929, at St. John's United Church, Toronto.

A prayer in union for the general work of the Society was followed by the Lord's Prayer. 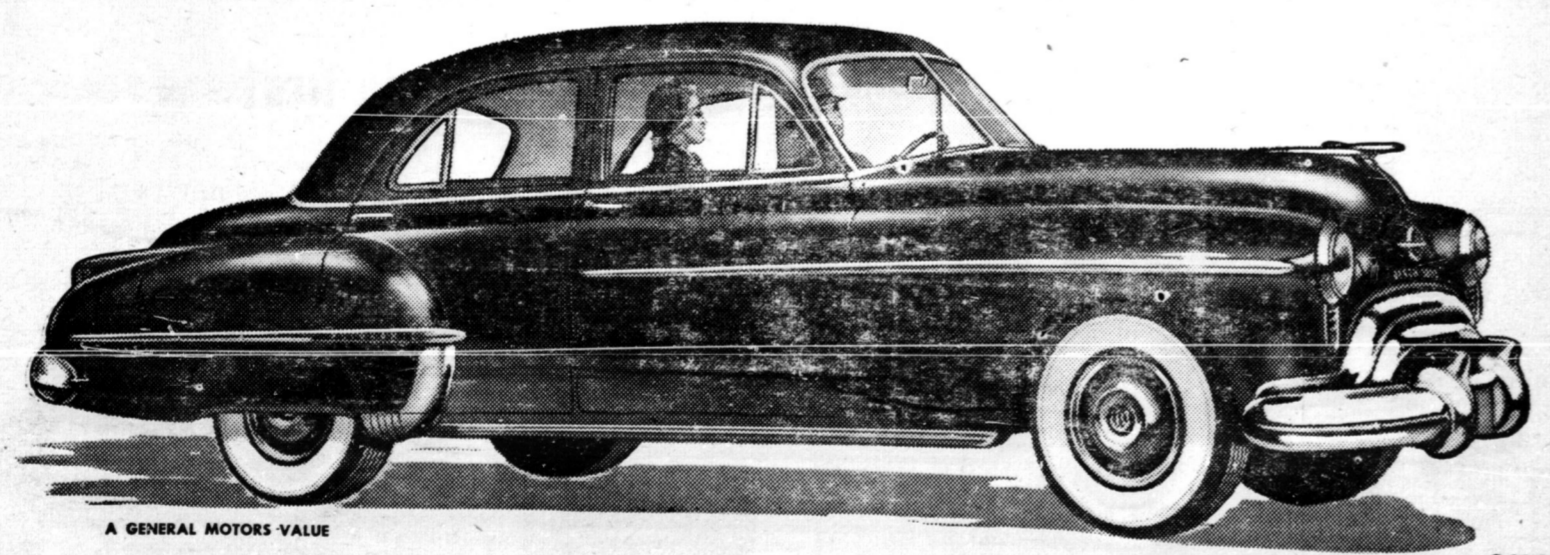
