ERIE VIEW FARM FORUM

Erie View Forum held its third meeting of the season on Monday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Field. After listening to the National Farm Radio Forum broadcast, the group decided to discuss the various aspects of Forest Conservation, under the title "Forests—Slash or Save?"

In Norway and Sweden no one is permitted to cut trees, even on his own property, without consent from a forest supervisor. In considering whether or not this would be a feasible policy in Canada, it was noted that in Haldimand County it is permissible to cut trees of over a certain size and then to plant a permit. It was felt that this condition should be Dominion-wide, where necessary.

It was not thought that on the whole, local farmers are reaping rich harvests from their woodlots nor are the woodlots being well managed. Useless trees should be eliminated; woodlots should be fenced from livestock seeking pasture; and the advice of a forester should be sought when beginning improvements. This latter was done, in one instance, with no more success than a letter of acknowledgement, but it was thought that it might be a unique case.

The last phase of the topic considered shelterbelts and whether or not they would pay farmers in this area. Around buildings, they would cause a saving in fuel; would be a protection for the house; a guard against drifting snow; and a thing of beauty. Field shelterbelts would help to curb soil drifting and wind erosion and would prove to be a cover for wild life which is rapidly disappearing.

Farm woodlots are a profitable enterprise for the future generations and are an excellent, even essential, means of utilizing unutilized land. The statement was made that good agriculture requires twenty-five per cent forest cover, and Walpole Township has a scant half of one per cent, while Haldimand County can boast only about three per cent.
