A friend of ours having noted that we have become embroiled in a little further in political activity recently, he said, "Why?" We asked, "Well," he said, "any one that gets mixed up in politics these days is just a darn fool." We didn't get really mad until he was out of earshot, which is probably a good thing, otherwise we wouldn't have been able to start this column by referring to him as a friend.

It seems to us that many people have a peculiar opinion of politics. It seems to us that politics is the very basis of our system of democratic government, which, as the Great Emancipator said, is of the people, by the people and for the people. And in our opinion, any one who isn't mixed up in politics must think that the 1914-18 conflict and every other war since was just to give our best blood a free ocean trip.

To take an active part in a political organization doesn't mean you are joining a hate society with your vengeance aimed at those lending allegiance to another point of view. It is rather, to give of your best as a citizen to help provide the forces that go to make up a free democratic government. The people themselves by the right of the free ballot decide who will govern. But the system at the same time provides an alert and effective opposition to the ruling force. When the Government fails to discharge its duty to the people there is always an alternative political group ready to take over—that is so long as there are responsible citizens.

Our friend (we haven't talked to him since) but we think any fool if he likes, but we think any one who spreads the insidious propaganda that politics is a dirty business had better get behind the iron curtain for awhile and maybe he will get some sense knocked into his head by referring to him as a friend.

Now that we are talking about politics, it might be as well to say that many municipalities are nominating their 1951 council this month. Jarvis and Walpole will do it in December. Here again democratic responsibility comes to the fore. The easiest way is to just sit home and let someone else worry about nominating candidates to discharge the public business for the ensuing year and then crab about the way the municipal business is conducted for the next twelve months. It is not the way anyone who recognizes their responsibilities as a citizen does it. He goes to the nomination meeting and vents his wrath before the retiring council—that is if he is wrathful—and makes his recommendations for improvement. In addition he will permit his name to stand for election if he can convince anyone else he is right. If he

is happy about the condition of the municipal affairs he should go and express his appreciation for a job well done. One thing above all, he will not fail to cast a ballot if an election takes place.

If there is anything wrong with politics it is the lack of interest in it. We sometimes wonder how much longer the attitude can prevail without really serious consequences developing.
