Hockey Notes

Hello hockey fans, the Erie Hockey League is through its second week of the schedule and to date there is a four way tie for top spot, which is about as close as it could be.

At the start of the season the majority of fans (ourselves included) figured Selkirk would be the team to beat. After watching the first games we're not so sure. As yet we don't think Selkirk has shown the condition that the other clubs have.

At last Monday night's games, we couldn't be present but a couple of scouts brought us most of the details so we'll pass along what news we have.

The first game between Garnet and Kohler, went to Kohler by a four to three score as Jack Phibbs tallied all three Garnet goals. J. Stallwood, Garnet goalie, stopped a puck with his eye at the start of the game and after receiving medical attention, played the rest of the game. Garnet was short-handed, having only eight men in uniform.

Garnet took the lead at 12:05 of the first on a goal by Jack Phibbs. Kohler tying the score at 15:25 on a goal by C. Nagel with L. Rickert getting the assist. O. Shank put Kohler one up at the 17:20 mark on a pass from Baird. At 19:35 Johnson the colored boy with Kohler, scored on a pass from Baird.

In the second period which was the last one in that game owing to a late start, Jack Phibbs put Garnet back in the game scoring at 1:50 and 7:20 both on passes from Alvin Phillips. At 12:30 Jack Nixon received the only penalty of the game and at 12:45 C. Nagel scored the winning goal on a pass from Rickert. Due to the wintry weather the crowd was somewhat smaller than the previous week. While we're waiting for a report on the second game, perhaps we can fill in with a little hockey gossip.
