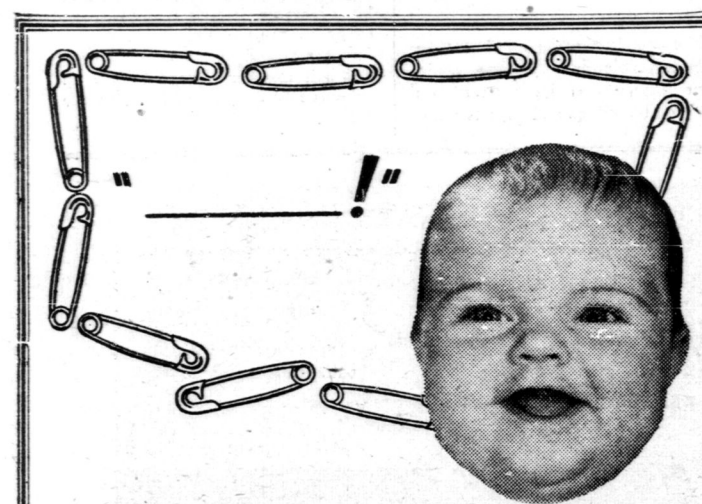

One other point made by the Dairy Branch is that quality milk is clean milk, not milk which has been cleaned through the use of a strainer or filter. The farmer himself can take the necessary steps to improve the situation. For producers wishing further information on this subject the Dairy Branch has a leaflet called "Hints on Keeping Sediment Out of Milk". It also contains directions for the proper use of filters. The leaflet can be obtained by writing to the Dairy Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Parliament Buildings, Toronto or by placing a request with the plant receiving the milk.

Improvement until the aim of no milk rejected is achieved. Indeed they point out that while milk grading is acceptable for production there is room for improvement here and that if there is sediment in the milk, it is a danger sign. By checking with the inspector or fieldman from the plant to find the cause of the trouble, it will be possible to clear it up, thus improving both the returns at the farm and the overall quality of Ontario Dairy products.

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
