**Red Hill Third To Perish In Attempt To Master Niagara**

William (Red) Hill who perished in the attempt to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel was the third person in twenty years to die in the attempt.

Hill, himself, had witnessed the destruction of the two others when they tried to navigate the torrent in 1920. Charles G. Stephens, a British subject, was the first to die. He was used as a ballast. George L. St. Charles, a Greek, was drowned when his barrel sprang a leak.

The 35-year-old Hill made the attempt in a special craft he constructed from 13 puncture-proof inner tubes reinforced with web netting. He was confident he would make the journey safely last Sunday on the brink, and then plunged over the falls. He was killed by the impact of the water.

Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the barn on the farm of Wray Craddock in the fourth Concession of Walpole early Tuesday morning. Also lost in the fire were two pigs, one calf, 250 chickens, 75 tons of hay, 15 tons of straw, a m-k ing machine and other barn tools.

The fire apparently started around 2:30 A.M. as the glow in the sky was noticed by William Evans, of Nanticoke, at that time. He thought it was possibly a fire so far away as Jarvis. John Meyer, who is employed at the Hagersville Army Camp and who lives two miles north of the Craddock farm, saw the glow in the sky as he drove through Jarvis on his way home. It was not until he arrived at the blazing building, after driving another five miles, that Mr. Craddock was awakened.

By that time the roof was falling in and shortly after help arrived. The Jarvis Fire Department was called. The barn was a comparatively new structure, having been built only ten years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Craddock had been visiting their son, Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Craddock in Jarvis and did not arrive home until after midnight. At that time Mr. Craddock closed a door in the barnhouse, located a short distance south of the barn. He noticed nothing unusual at that time. The fifteen tons of straw lost in the fire, had been baled and placed in the barn only the day before. The barn was a comparatively new structure, having been built only ten years ago.
