We suspect he is walking up and down in front of The Record office with a sign proclaiming to the public that "The Boss is Unfair."

Senator Crear chairman of The Senate Committee on Finance reports as follows: "In the judgment of your committee the steady growth that has been apparent for quite a number of years of dependence upon the State, can lead to only one of two results: Either in a steady increase in the power of the State over the rights of the citizens, or the breakdown of democratic representative government as we have understood it and practised it in the past. The lessons of history in this respect are clear for all to read."

Unfortunately Senator, the Canadian people are too susceptible to bribes through subsidies, bonuses and pensions to pay heed to this truth.

We have another interesting item before us from the report of the proceedings of the Senate Committee on Finance. It indicates how our way of life is threatened by radio and television. The following dialogue (in part) is between the chairman of the committee and A. Davidson Dundas, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation:

The Chairman: "Do you have any difficulty in getting artists — I suppose I might call them artists — to take part in these forums?"

Mr. Dundas: "Quite often we do. It is not easy to find someone who is an authority on a subject and a good broadcaster and many people seem to be diffident about going on the air. During the years we have been particularly disappointed because of the difficulty of getting good business men to take part in a broadcast."

The Chairman: "I suppose you have no difficulty in getting certain classes to speak those who have some particular views that they wish to publicize?"

Mr. Dundas: "There are some people who are too easy to get and whom we have tried to avoid."

In our opinion and we suggest, in the opinion of all right-thinking Canadians, the C.B.C. could try avoiding some of these people just a little harder without causing any dissatisfaction to the listening public.
