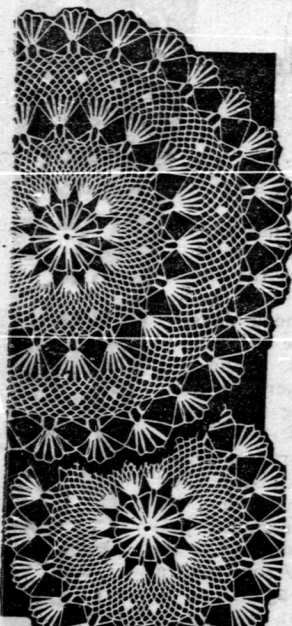
Your Family Counselor
