*On The
Farm
Front*

It is good business to conserve this equipment. The average farmer has a heavy investment and every year longer the equipment can be made to operate means that much less overhead per year. Did you ever stop to figure out how much you had invested in farm machinery it might startle you. For that reason the storage of all equipment is a must. We cannot afford to let the heavens be the roof over its head.

There is a possibility of organizing another Dairy Herd Improvement Association in Haldimand County during the coming months. Any one interested should get in touch with the Agricultural Representative as soon as possible. The cost is low but the returns are high. Those who are members of the association now in operation are well pleased with the work that is being done and the benefits to be derived. The association is for the average farmer with more than half of his herd as graders but who is anxious to get some information on the production of his herd and to eliminate the low producers. Ask about this project.

Do you use the same broom to sweep the manure as you do the floor behind the cows? If you do there is the possibility of your spreading disease from one cow to another. Bang's disease for instance could very easily be spread in this way. But there are others as well and the small extra cost involved it would pay to have separate brooms, one for the manger and one for the gutter and floor behind.

Another factor in this labour problem is that help is not always available just when you want it. For that reason it would be a good idea to plan now for the help that will be needed and make your way known to those that have arrangements to fill your needs. It is true this will require some careful study on the part of the farmer as to what his production plans for the 1952 season will be but it has never hurt anyone to make plans for the future. It is much better to make a plan and work to it than to have no plan and suddenly find oneself very much in need of help with none available.

High quality hay is one of the important feeds for a calf and here is the one exception to the rule about overfeeding. Really there is little danger of having a calf eat too much hay if the quality is high enough. There is nothing better than well saved, second-cut, alfalfa.

**ONTARIO HIGHWAY TRUCKS
NEW LIGHTING EQUIPMENT**

All Ontario Department of Highways snowplows and ice-control trucks used for salting and sanding are being equipped with two-way flashing blue lights which will throw powerful and piercing beams, front and rear, to warn motorists meeting or overtaking them on the highways of this province. These flashing beams, restricted to the vehicles mentioned, will indicate mobile units that are wider than standard cars and trucks and that may have, under certain conditions, the ready extra portion hidden by snow streamers from plows or smog from sand and chemicals. All snowplows and ice-control vehicles move at speeds varying from slow to moderate. That permits swift braking in emergencies or stoppage due to running into banks or other major obstacles. The flashing blue lights also indicate vehicles that can and do lurch sideways suddenly through hitting snow-hidden obstacles such as a block of ice, broken tree limb, or something that may have fallen from vehicle.

In deference to suggestion from the Chief Constables Association of Canada, the Ontario Department of Highways is installing two-way blue flashing lights on approximately 1,000 of its snowplows and ice-control trucks. The police chiefs feel that red danger signals should be restricted to emergency ambulances and fire fighting vehicles. It is interesting to note that blue is one of the oldest of warning colors. In the Middle Ages, it was believed that, when a candle burned blue, "Sudden death" or other disasters threatened. It is worth recalling, too, that the two-way flashing signals on Ontario Department of Highways vehicles remind of the old Roman god, Janus, patron of doors, portals and new beginnings. It is hoped to have all the Department's 1,000 winter road maintenance vehicles so equipped by early in January, 1952, the month named for the two-faced deity.

Two thousand of the five and a half inch sealed beam driving unit lights have been ordered to equip 1,000 vehicles and snowplows. Flashing lights may be seen now in a number of Ontario Department of Highways divisions. It is hoped that all motorists will recognize and instantly as warnings to reduce speed and drive with special caution and alertness while in vicinity of the vehicles.
