

POULTRY & EGG PROSPECTS - 1951

Following is a quotation from the January Bulletin of the Ontario Retail Feed Dealers' Association:

"Don't allow the high feed costs currently noted to interfere with chick orders for this Spring. Encourage your poultrymen not only to maintain flock levels but to increase if at all possible to do so. At the Winter Meeting of the Poultry Industry Committee held recently, it was agreed that a minimum increase of 10% over last year's hatch would be required to fill the normal demand. New markets and outlets for eggs may be expected during the year to further tax our production. The general outlook is good and we suggest to all dealers the promotion of optimism within the poultry industry for 1951 at least." (End quote).

"THEY"

HARDLY a conversation lasting more than a few minutes in our town is complete without some reference to the word "they."

"They" should do this, that or the other thing to improve the community.

This is a situation that is by no means confined to our town. It is common throughout the province and the nation.

Just who "they" are, we are not sure. We suspect, however, that Governments — municipal, provincial or federal, are involved somehow.

By taking the attitude that "they" should be responsible for everything, we shuffle off any feeling that we, personally, are responsible in any way to see to it that things are accomplished.

In our town we hear such questions as: Why don't "they" get started to build the new Community hall? Why don't "they" fix up the old Town Hall, it's plenty good enough? Why don't "they" get more industries in town? Why don't "they" build a theatre here so the young people will have something to go to at nights? etc., etc.

This "they" business, we believe, is symptomatic of the "leave it to George" attitude that is prevalent all over the country.

Isn't it about time we realized that instead of "they" we should say, "we" and then go ahead and get things done?

Nothing is impossible if "we" really want it and go after it. How? By thinking and planning and working together; by putting our best effort into any project we want carried out.

What our town and indeed all Canada needs is more "we" — a lot more — and less "they."

TWO CONFLICTS

THE WORLD IS GOING through two conflicts.

The first is an effort to save a way of life which western peoples have built up through 1,000 years or more, and which now seems ready to give a richer reward than ever before.

The second is against poverty, to the extent that it still remains in the western world, but especially as it exists among most of the world's peoples.

The first conflict, for our way of life, gets more attention because unless it is won, the second cannot be successful. But unless the second, the war against poverty, can also be won, the first cannot be won on any permanent basis.

Conceivably the first could be won by a relatively short, sharp conflict. The second, at best, will require generations to win, and envisions changes in thinking which we can scarcely grasp as yet.

The western world has long given a lip-alienation to the question, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

But as long as its brothers, in their teeming millions, remained quiet and virtually powerless, it did not worry too much about them. Now the brothers are to have their "say."

It is not an informed "say" to western thinking, but it is a powerful "say" to a better way of living, but a gun, or an atom bomb, is virtually as effective in the hands of the man who has no political background as in the hands of the man who has.

So we have to learn to live with our brothers everywhere on this very small earth.

Even as in the western world a majority group will not indefinitely tolerate the good things of life going to a privileged class, so in things of life going to the majority of peoples will not tolerate the good things going only to a few privileged races.

There may yet be time to make the process of change gradually and peacefully, but there is not much time.
