interfere with chick orders for this Spring. Encourage your poultrymen not only to maintain flock levels but to increase if at all possible to do so. At the Winter Meeting of the Poultry Industry Committee held recently, it was agreed that a minimum increase of 10% over last year's hatch would be required to fill the normal demand. New markets and outlets for eggs may be expected during the year to further tax our production. The general outlook is good and we suggest to all dealers the promotion of optimism within the poultry industry for 1951 at least."
