OLD AGE SECURITY -

STATISTICS always make me sleepy, and one glance at a page of tabulated figures is enough to put me into a state of coma. This reflection arose after a reading of a report of the Joint Committee of the Senate and the House of Commons on Old Age Security. The committee met in May, 1950, to consider "A Canadian Programme of Social Security" prepared by Dr. Harry M. Cassidy of Toronto University. It is a program for the financing and administration of the Welfare State. The committee was interested only in the part that dealt with old age pensions. This provided for pensions for men at the age of 65, and for women at 60; the over-all cost of which would be about \$400 million a year, to be "financed by means of contributions from individuals, provincial govern-ments and the Dominion." Minimum individmal contributions would be \$15. and maximum \$100, according to income. Provincial govern-

number was up to 5,200,000, but the average per family was down to 2.1 children. The reduced 1941 average reflects the lower birth rate of the the Consolidated Revenue Fund."
