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"Hoot Mon"

A Vancouver veterinarian of complicated ancestry (Scottish not included) has set the heather ablaze by pronouncing "haggis" impure food. As might be expected the over was quickly resented.

On this "hooch" night, the 192nd anniversary of the birth of the world's sweetest food, Scotland round the globe will forget for a moment the immortal memory of the haggis, the address to the Haggis. As soon as the delectable morsel, proceeded by a pipper, has been properly placed, an honored member of the company will recite the famous eulogy, beginning: "Fair fa' your honest, sovie face, Aboon them a' you tak your place, with the emphasis on 'haggis' and 'face'. There will be no evidence of thought or impure food as 'Auld gude-man' and no evidence of collapse as the ruffians ring with the strains of "The Star of Robbie Burns."

The writer has shared in such orgies on many occasions, taken a much needed rest, and lived to tell the tale.

There is no foundation in fact by the critics of the past two years. That sons of the heather assemblage on January 25th for a general coronation, devour haggis and pretend to like it and indulge unduly in heather dew, is a gross, neglected lie, who in spite of the handicap of drug, drug, left to the world a legacy of sweetest songs and unexcelled lyrics. While "haggis" is a specified feature of Burns Club annals and gatherings of kindred organizations, it is but secondary to the strains of "Annie Laurie", "Ye Banks and Braes", "Bonnie Doon" and "Scots Wha Hae" which will melt the hearts and fire the patriotism of prince and peasant, cleric and layman, rich and poor meet in night on common ground, to honor the author of the universal then "Auld Lang Syne."

Burns works need no apology. The Collins Saturday Night show would have made him immortal. It is a striking tribute to his worth that his writings are today the most widely quoted of all secular literature. It was the irony of fate that he was, during his brief earthly tenure, denied the boon his sensitive soul craved. With prophetic vision he drew near "they will respect me in a hundred years hence" and his fallings, which were many, are an open book which rugged honesty forbade him to conceal.

His humble birthplace is to day a shrine attracting thousands of wandering feet. Following a vast throng, Col. Robert Ingersoll wrote and said: "A bit of a roofed in with straw and one door shuts out the snow and storm. And yet I stand within this room and hold all thrills in awe. For here beneath this lowly thatched roof, the sweetest bard was born. Within this hallowed hall, he felt as one who clings to a shrine. When the glad lips at last have touched, we something deemed divine. And here the world through all the years, As long as day returns, The tribute of its love and tears Will pay to Robert Burns."

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
