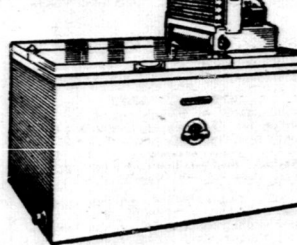

PRINCESS AND DUKE TO VISIT CANADA

An announcement of great interest to the Canadian people was made by Prime Minister St. Laurent over the week end. Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh plan to visit Canada, the latter part of September for a four week tour of the Dominion.

The new Ontario Bull Premium Policy is now in force and replaces the former policy whereby clubs consisting of two or more persons could obtain a premium when buying bulls at an approved sale. Under the new policy individual buyers can qualify for the premium. The bulls in question must be purchased at an approved sale and be of either Short-horn, Hereford or Aberdeen Angus breeding. They must be ten months of age or over, well grown for their age and typical of the breed. The premium amounts to 20 per cent of the purchase price but not exceeding \$75.00 and in no case can a purchaser qualify for more than one such premium in any one year. Application forms can be had from your agricultural representative.

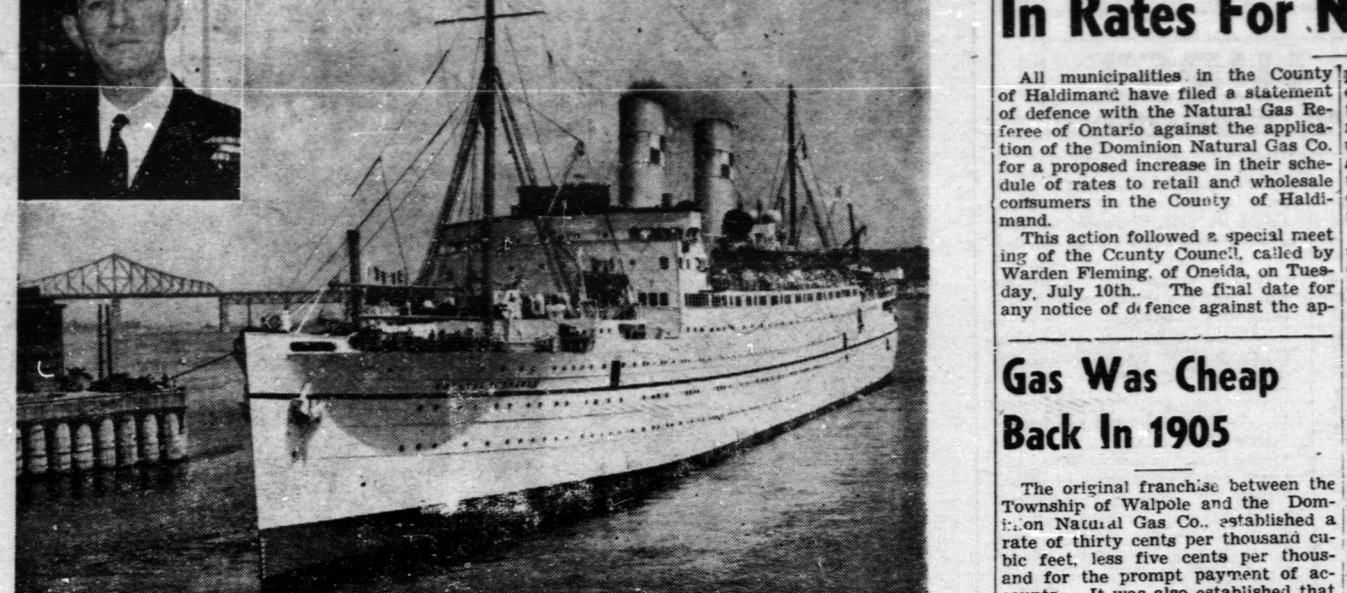

The 20,000-ton Canadian Pacific liner Empress of France, in regular service between Liverpool, England, and Montreal, has been chosen to carry Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh to Canada for their tour of this country. Inset shows Captain B. B. Grant, a veteran of thirty-two years' service with Canadian Pacific Steamships, who holds the rank of Commodore in the Royal Navy Reserve, and who will be in command of the vessel on her historic voyage. Also on board the ship on the trip are several company officers and men who attended King George and Queen Elizabeth on the Empress of Britain when they returned to the United Kingdom following their tour of Canada in 1939. The Empress will sail from Liverpool with the royal couple, September 25th, arriving at Quebec, October 1st.

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Haldimand Municipalities Oppose Proposed Increase In Rates For Natural Gas

All municipalities in the County of Haldimand have filed a statement of defense with the Natural Gas Referee of Ontario against the application of the Dominion Natural Gas Co. for a proposed increase in their schedule of rates to retail and wholesale consumers in the County of Haldimand.

This action followed a special meeting of the County Council, called by the Referee on July 11th, when the County Council met in special session on Tuesday night and confirmed the action taken by the Referee in supporting the motion of defense through the County Council and at the same time authorized him to enter into a financial arrangement with the County Council to defray expenses and to take any further action deemed necessary to carry the defense to a successful conclusion.

The Dominion Natural Gas Co. is asking for a flat rate of \$1.75 for the thousand feet of gas, or less, consumed, plus an increase of approximately 40 cents per thousand feet for additional thousand feet consumed. This is in addition to the supplemental rate of 30 cents per thousand feet. It is impossible to realize a fair return on their capital investment. They suggest that they should realize at least seven per cent on their investment.

The Jarvis Council takes the view that there is no justification for the present supplemental rate of thirty cents per thousand now being charged local users of natural gas for the maintenance and operation of pressure plants at Brantford and Stanley.

The original franchise granted to the Dominion Natural Gas Company by the Township of Walpole back in 1905 the Company agreed to furnish consumers in Walpole (of which Jarvis was then a part) of with gas at the full extent of the capacity of their wells in the said Township. It was understood that the Company would maintain the rate of supply at a level which would enable them to pay the supplemental rate.

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
