LOWER FIRE DAMAGE

The Ontario Fire Marshall's office reported this week that property damage by fires in Ontario in the second quarter of the year was \$2,425,000 lower than the \$6,834,851 total in the same three months of 1950. Altogether this year there have been 7,759 fires causing property loss of \$8,924,511. The human toll in the second quarter of 1951 was 28 dead and 108 injured, and 11 of the dead were children.

War against "smoke-eating" should start in the home. Proper cognizance of the seriousness of the situation now could prevent loss of life and limb in mob action in the future.

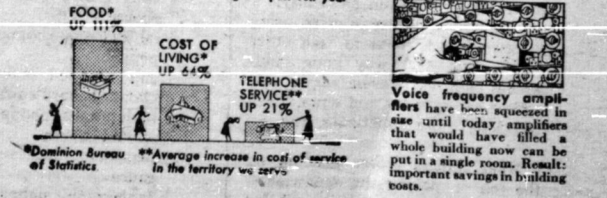

On The Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

What to do with the wheat crop is the burning question at the moment. This is not an easy answer and in the final analysis each farmer will have to answer it for himself. Right at the moment it would look as though the market may open up a little lower than it did last year, but no one seems to know what it will do from there on.

South-Western market but not yet in sufficient volume to create any trends. Farm ers who everyone else may have to adopt a "wait and see" attitude.

With the heavy intruders that the "fly" has made in the crop in many sections of the Province and including Haldimand, there is always the possibility that the total crop will not be quite as large as last year. This in turn should strengthen the

market. In that event the farmer probably should consider ways and means of storing as much of the crop as possible for what looks like a heavy crop of spring grain and for that reason the empty box stall may be pressed into service as a temporary storage. Brooder houses that have been well built and given some reinforcement can also be used for this purpose.

There is one precaution that farmers storing grain should take and that is to make sure the grain is in proper condition before putting into any kind of storage. One dealer in Haldimand is reported to have turned down over 25,000 bushels of wheat last year that were damaged in storage. Musty wheat is not saleable and the new crop this year will need close attention to avoid severe loss as though the market may open up a little lower than it did last year, but no one seems to know what it will do from there on.

Some Haldimand farmers are still declaring they may not sow any wheat this fall because of the "fly". As has been pointed out in this column on two previous occasions there is nothing to show that this is the case. There is no reason to believe that the Haldimand fly will be bad next year just because it was this year. It will be bad, of course, unless certain precautions are observed. Where fields are not seeded down, all wheat stubble should be plowed under completely as soon as possible after the wheat has been harvested. The soil should then be worked in order to assist in getting it to sprout. This wheat will be earlier than the regular crop and will set (continued on page eight)
