While Ontario farms are heading for a record year of crops, reports this week also showed creamery butter production is stepping up.

Butter production totalied 7,750,000 pounds in May, a gain of 2.3 per cent over the 7,577,000 pounds of May, 1949. For the first five months of the year the butter total was 22,438,700 pounds, compared with 24,960,700 in the same period last year.

Production of concentrated milk products, also increased last month jumping 32 per cent over the same month last year. Output was 27, 435,800, pounds compared with 2,45,800 in 1951. Cheddar cheese production is down to 13,250,400 pounds see far this year compared with 16,455,200 in 1951. Cheddar production in May was 7,108,800 pounds compared with 8,725,800 in May 1950.
