## Cease Fire Proposed

The president of the United Nations General Assembly, Narolab Entozam, took personal charge at New York Tuesday of growing U.N. efforts to determine Moscow's terms for ending the war in Korea. He was to confer with Russian delegate Jakob Malik who started the world allied forces from all Korea. They mistook in the afternoon. United Nations delegates were puzzled by the lack of further conditions in the Russian proposal, such as withdrawal of all troops from all Korea. They suspected there was a snag in it somewhere.

## On the Farm

**BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER**  
— By Halldimar Harty —  
It was reported in this column about two months ago that hog prices would advance from the low level they were at at that time and this has been born out by the quotations of last week when hogs were as high as 36c at Toronto, the highest that have ever been on the Toronto market.

Hog marketing are still below the 1950 figure. In Ontario they are short to the tune of 57,000 up to June 9th. This shortage is due to the estimates made earlier. How will it change and during the last three months of 1951 will see an increase. Even in Halldimar it is anticipated that the marketings will be up slightly and for the province this may amount to a rise over five per cent.

Another need that has made some headway in Halldimar is Orange Juice. The price of this commodity is now down. Devil's Paint Brush, which did not average out as well as we thought, is now making a profit. Orange Hawkeed is a low-growing perennials with creeping branches close to the ground and it is fairly widely grown. The flowers are a bright yellow in colour and about an inch across.

Where the soil can be worked, cultivation is the method of control. A good crop rotation which includes the breaking up of the soil rather frequently is highly satisfactory. On poor land it may be necessary to use one of the chemicals now on the market. Eight to twelve ounces of 2-4-D ester type will give good control. Later applications do not seem to be as effective. Where small patches occur salt and sodium chlorate have been used to advantage. Sodium sulphate will give a good kill. In cases where it is not wise to allow cattle to graze as they might eat sufficient to cause illness and even death. Usually it is safe to graze after the weeds have completely died down.

Speaking of chemical weed control brings to mind a couple of new plants that are now available. They are Detoxin Circular No. 75, "Handbook of Chemical Weed Control" an Extension Circular No. 75, "Handbook of Chemical Weed Control".
