Now that we have reached the sugaring down season, we are sure all maple syrup lovers will be interested to know how this Canadian delicacy happened to be discovered. We were sitting up with Charles Bier, Jr. on Saturday night along with Cy Saunders, trying to calm the formers' nerves in having become a father a few hours earlier. As we were stroking Charles' brow, Cy, never having had experience in such matters as becoming a father, began to relate the story of the origin of maple syrup. Most inappropriate we thought at the time, but peculiarly enough the story comes back to us.
