over several times but no scoring resulted. After an intermission, sudden death overtime was started and right off the bat, Cambray put on terrific pressure as Vern Weaver stopped five shots in the first minute of play. At 2:02, Carl Tamblin took a shot at the corner of the net from about fifteen feet out, Vern appeared to have the shot blocked but it slipped into the net, amid thunderous cheers from Cambray fans.

Both goalies turned in fine efforts in the game and had little chance on the shots that burst them. Every player gave his best and anyone with any idea that rural hockey was slow and crude would have received several eye-openers in this series. We would be willing to bet that some of these players could skate with any intermediate player in the vicinity.

It was one of the best series of hockey that it has been our privilege to witness and the remark was made before the sudden death period started Tuesday night, that after nearly 215 minutes of play, the score was still tied and one goal was going to win the series.

It was a heartbreaker to lose and a home town war was waged warning to see the sportsmanship that prevailed amongst players and fans alike. Selkirk took their defeat like the good sports that they are and Cambray has their wishes in their quest for the title, when they meet either Lambeth or Lamb combined with Glen.
