TWO PROVINCIALS MOVE TO HAGERSVILLE

A couple of years ago the Provincial Police Force in the County were directed to move to the County Town and all Provincial Police activities were directed from that point. It has been announced, however, that two men on the force will take up residence in Hagersville immediately for the purpose of a better patrol of No. 6 Highway. Constables James Motley and Len Reid are the two officers who will make the move.

BY-LAW No. 168
OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF JARVIS

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED as follows:
1. No person shall allow his female dog to run at large while it is in heat or during the months of May, June, July, August and September.
2. No person shall allow his male dog to run at large during the month of May, June, July, August and September.
3. The purpose of this Section is a dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found in a highway or other public place and not under the control of any person.
4. Any person allowing his dog to run at large contrary to this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of \$50.00 exclusive of costs and every such penalty shall be recoverable under the Summary Convictions Act.
5. Any dog running at large contrary to the provisions of this by-law may be seized and impounded and may then be sold or destroyed as hereinafter provided.
6. The Village Constable shall impound all dogs running at large contrary to this by-law and not destroyed by him in accordance with Section 5, subject to the right of the owner to redeem the same within Twenty-four (24) hours from the time of impounding by paying for the use of the Corporation a fine of \$2. for each dog and if the same are not redeemed by the owner within twenty-four (24) hours after the time they may be sold by the Village Constable to any person upon payment of a sum of not less than \$2.00 each for the use of this Corporation, but in the event of no sale within Forty-eight (48) hours from the time of impounding then every such dog shall be destroyed by the Village Constable.

Recent years have seen farmers, as individuals, through their commodity groups or collectively as the industry of Agriculture, seek by many ways a greater measure of control of their business.
No other industry in our economic structure has been so lacking in power to conduct its own affairs, has ever been so subject to control by other industries and commerce, or with its business life so throttled by multiple outside factors.
It has been afforded little in the way of protective legislation but, at the will of legislators, is often used and particularly so its products, as a political weapon both domestically and internationally.
Is it any wonder then, that in these days of struggle for personal and occupational security, we see agriculture fighting for greater control of its own affairs, has ever been so subject to control by other industries and commerce, or with its business life so throttled by multiple outside factors.
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
