BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED o'clock which will include the operet-

2. No person shall allow his male dog to run at large during the months of May, June, July, August and September.

3. For the purposes of this Section a dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found in a highway or other public place, and not under the control of any person.

4. Any person allowing his dog to run at large contrary to this by-law

4. Any person allowing his dog to run at large contrary to this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of \$50.00 exclusive of costs and every such penalty shall be recoverable under The Summary Convictions Act.

5. Any dog running at large contrary to the provisions of this bylaw may be (seized and) killed by the Village Constable.



Recent years have seen farmers, as individuals, through their commodity groups, or collectively as the industry of Agriculture, seek by many ways a greater measure of control of their business. No other industry in our economic structure has been so lacking in power to conduct its own affairs, has ever been so subject to control by other industries and commerce, or with its business life so throttled by multiple outside factors. It has been afforded

liftle so throttled by multiple outside factors. It has been alrohed little in the way of protective legislation but, at the will of legislators, is often used and particularly so its products, as a political weapon both domestically and internationally.

Is it any wonder then, that in these days of struggle for personal and occupational security, we see agriculture fighting for greater control of its own affairs? In their own particular struggles of the processed fair in recent years perhaps farther greater control of its own affairs? In their own particular stuggle, farmers have progressed far in recent years, perhaps farther and with greater success than is generally realized. They have acquired a new knowledge, a new great strength and a new way of effectively solving many of the problems besetting them. They are no longer weakened by their individualism and the time has now come when their weight is being felt by the nation, its industry and commerce, its people and policy makers to an extent never before known.

This new agriculture has come to many as a rude awakening for to some degree agriculture was looked upon as an industry of servitude, dormant in power, both commercially and politically in similar manner as many have regarded some of the lesser development nations of the world. Their disregard and complacent attitude towards agriculture has suffered a jolt for it did not keep pace with the rapid development of the latent strength of agriculture.

Rural people, first in one direction, then in another, reached out and gained control, or created for themselves, certain services and industries essential to them. Producer organized and operated supply and selling agencies, the manufacture or processing of some essential farm commodities, insurance in its various forms, credit insitutions and lately in Ontario the proposed acquisition of a meat packing plant.

experts that farmers cannot do this or that, they have dether this ancial strength, economic wisdom or ability to conduct a business other than actual farming and the venture is doomed to failure. Some have failed and there will be others. It is unreasonable to suppose that each attempt will be successful, but by and large, the majority are.

Farmer owned and operated business outside of actual farm operations are now manifold, but are according to need only. This is an important fact to bear in mind, for rural people are not avaricious and do not intend to create or plan monopolies. Only when the lack of a service needed by their industry is apparent or any service is extracting an unjust profit at the expense of agriculture, do farmers venture into these fields and then only to

culture, do farmers venture into these fields and then only to the extent which they are needed.

Farmers are gradually changing the whole structure of business relating to agriculture. Perhaps this is the shortest and most direct way to occupational equality. It is being forced upon them, not altogether intentionally, but it is happening. Farmers have a different way and attitude towards life than any other group. They live not just for today, but also tomorrow and the generations to follow us. Industry and commerce live for today, and today's profits are their sole purpose. Their great pressure upon our government has indirectly caused the agricultural future of our country to be sacrificed.
