LETTER TO THE EDITOR

At Sea Aboard U.S.N.S. *Marine Arrow*
April 27, 1951

Dear Laird:
Well here I am again. With just a short note to let you know that we are on our way over. We left Seattle, Washington aboard the good ship *Marine Arrow* at 4:30 Thursday, April 19th which in Jarvis would be 7:30 in the evening and have been on the water ever since. To day as I write you it is Thursday last night and Friday here. Due to the fact that we have crossed the 180th Meridian of Longitude. When the Meridian is crossed you automatically advance twenty-four hours so as to conform with the time standards of the land. As I write we are about 7,000 miles from Jarvis and in rough seas. It has been rather comical today at meals to watch the ladies try to hang on to their trays and pour coffee at the same time. Some of the ladies were getting brave and standing close to the bow of the ship watching the waves break over the side. I guess I better keep my big ole come over. I am one of the fingers crew and have not got as sick yet. I guess I better keep my number of boys with us that were at Hagersville Army Camp, such as S. G. Cruik, W. G. 2, and the Royal 22nd. Cpl. Watson and Smith that were known by some of the Army Personnel living in Jarvis.

Aboard ship we have the Royal 22nd Canadian Engineers, Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps, R.C.E.M.C., Royal Canadian Corps Signals and just but not least, Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps.

On the 25th of April we passed the Aleutian Chain and it is a great wonder to me that anyone could even exist on those islands. The Aleutians are settled by white people in a few places and there are a few air bases there as that is the shortest air route between North America and Asia. As of tomorrow, April 26th, the M.O.'s start issuing new tablets which is a Malaria preventive and as the weather warms up they will issue a malaria tablet along with the other. The British were a little stronger. By present, it looks as if we will be into the future.
