

Last year 142 persons were killed at Railway crossings and 611 were injured, and in the first three months of this year the toll continued at an accelerated pece. In the three month period 53 were killed and 242 were injured. "Even though this fund was raised last year from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 annually it is not nearly enough for the entire country", said Mr. Catherwood. He said that increasing motor registrations were a factor. motor registrations were a factor, and he thought also that at present, many municipalities hesitate to ask for better railway crossing protection because of already over burdened budgets. The railways and the Government should bear a greater proportion of the cost, he said.
