REQUESTS MORE GOVERNMENT AID FOR GRADE CROSSINGS

The Government's \$1,000,000 annual contribution toward protection and elimination of Grade Crossings in Canada should be increased considerably, according to Earl Carterwood, M.P. for Haldimand.

The six-year toll across Canada from 1945 to 1950 has been 588 killed and 3015 injured according to information given by Mr. Carterwood to Hon. Lionel Chevrier, Minister of Transport.

Last year 142 persons were killed at Railway crossings and 611 were injured, and in the first three months of this year the toll continued at an accelerated pace. In the three month period 53 were killed and 242 were injured.

"Even though this fund was raised last year from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 annually it is not nearly enough for the entire country," said Mr. Carterwood. He said that increasing motor registrations was a factor, and he thought also that at present many municipalities hesitate to ask for better railway crossing protection because of already overburdened budgets. The railways and the Government should bear a greater proportion of the cost, he said.

County Census Commissioner Announces Appointments

The Army Camp also receives special enumeration under special direction.
