Following the judging the group returned to the Rural Youth Centre for lunch which was provided by the Haldimand Farmers' Co-operative. After lunch the contestants were required to give reasons on the classes judged. The Junior Farmers gave reasons on six classes judged and the High School section on three classes judged.

Judges for the competition included: Messrs. Joe Wilson, Andrew Daehner, G. G. Bramhill, G. E. Wilson, Harold Baker, Alex. Henry, Jack Vollick, Roy Hedley and Murray Coverdale.

There were thirty-four contestants in the Junior Section, nine in the Senior Section and seventy-two in the High School Section.

On the Farm Front

"If you feed your farm, it will feed you; if you feed it well, it will feed and clothe you; if you feed it according to the best known methods, it will feed, clothe and educate you, leaving a handsome balance to meet contingencies." Are you interested in the barn yard of hay? A new little bulletin has just been put out by the Department of Agriculture giving a report of three addresses by practical farmers on this subject at the annual meeting of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association last January. If you would like to have a copy of this interesting booklet, it is suggested that you pick up a copy at the office of the Agricultural Representative the next time you are in Cayuga. Prop a card in the mail and a copy will be sent you.

Many and diverse means of increasing crop production have been advanced but thus far there has never been any substitute found for grass management. Crop rotations have long been recognized for their value in that they adjust crop and livestock production to a grassland base. The ideal is to produce a permanent agriculture with high yields without in any way reducing the soil resources of the farm. A combination of grasses and clovers bringing together the good features of each and organic matter to the soil and create a favourable soil structure.
