Election Campaign Getting Into Gear

The campaign for the Ontario provincial election November 22 was in high gear this week as official nominations were set for Thursday. On official lists by Tuesday had shown a total of at least 250 candidates. These are 90 Progressive Conservatives, 88 Liberals, 71 C.C.F., five Labour-Progressives, two Liberal-Labour and three independents of various persuasions.

A challenge to Premier Frost to make public his Ontario government record and the C.C.F. platform was issued by C.C.F. leader E. E. Boyle at a campaign meeting in Peterborough Friday. Mr. Boyle said he was ready to meet the premier on any platform in any constituency at any time between now and November 22.

The C.C.F. leader said Premier Frost should show responsibility in the election late in November because thousands of rural and northern voters would be prevented from reaching the polls.

Mr. Boyle also expanded his criticism of the government's record on housing and hospital construction.

Premier Frost at Windsor said that neither the C.C.F. nor the Liberal parties had a chance of forming a strong government. He criticized former Liberal governments as "the party that chased 500 war veterans into the parliament building at Toronto and gave them the worst housing in the country."

The C.C.F. promise to pay 10 per cent of municipal budgets as a local tax measure. Premier Frost said "Mr. Boyle apparently doesn't know we're paying much more than 10 per cent in municipal grants."

Liberal Leader Walter Thompson said that the C.C.F. plan to reduce the gasoline tax. He said the present government while trying to attract tourists was actually scaring them away with the high gasoline tax. Mr. Thompson also declared that under a Liberal government Northern Ontario would be given a "new deal."

His promise to the north a university of its own, with facilities spread all over Northern Ontario.

Welfare Minister Goodfellow announced at Toronto that the provincial government has approved a 15 per cent increase in food allowance for single persons to \$4.39. Additional raises the weekly allowance for single persons to \$15.50. He promised to the regular aid is an allowance for milk.

Deer Hunting Ruled Out This Year In Haldimand

The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests has altered its regulations which had provided for an open season for deer in most of southern Ontario. The decision followed a deluge of protests from municipal councils, including the Haldimand County Council.

The Hon. Harold R. Scott, Minister of the Department, announced that there will be no open season for deer in the counties of Haldimand, Wentworth, Lincoln, Brant, Elgin, Essex, Huron, Lambton, Norfolk, Perth and Wellington.

There will, however, be an open season for deer limited to the use of bows and arrows and shotguns only in Oxford and Welland counties and in the counties of Hamilton, Peel, Middlesex with the exception of Moos and Westminster Townships; the county of Waterloo with the exception of North Dumfries and the County of York with the exception of Woolwich and Markham Townships.

The date for deer hunting in the above counties are December 3, 4 and 5.

The Counties of Bruce, Grey and Simcoe are open for deer on November 12 to 17 and rifles may be used in these counties.
