BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

- By Haldimand Harry -Weather conditions of the past week end will cause a flurry of ac-tivity to get livestock and poultry under cover as quickly as possible. In doing so it must be remembered that confining both livestock and poultry after being on free range or asture creates a rather sudden hange in the daily routine of the stock concerned. The change from a succulent ration such as pasture to dry feed will also present some prob-lems in feeding. These should be kept in mind and the adjustment should be made as gradually as posthe animal and its digestive system.

-oOo-This is also the time of year when a farmer may want to figure out how many bushels of grain he may have for feeding this winter and likewise how many tons of hay there may be in the mew or silage in the silo. All the various methods for arriving at information are contained in a booklet that you can get from your Agricultural Representative. Ask for a copy of Circular No. 68. "Guide to Crop Production in Ontar-ic"."

When it comes to figuring the bushels of corn in a crib however, it must be kept in mind that you can get only about half as much ear corn in the same storage as you can grain. It takes about 2½ cubic feet of space to store one bushel of ear corn as compared with 1.28—cubic feet for a bushel of grain.

Grain storage again brings up the problem of weevil damage and farm-ers are advised to watch their grain closely in order to avoid serious loss. Already it has been brought to our attention that many farmers are experiencing difficulty along this line, and there is evidence that weevil may be a serious problem this year. There are plenty of weevil remedies on the market and they emedies on the market and they should be used according to the manufacturer's directions.



THE NEW HURON COLLEGE OPENING






